Miranda: I love jamming out. I jam out in the shower, in the kitchen, everywhere!



Direct Question	Indirect Question
Do you like music?	Could you tell me if/whether you like music?
Can she sing?	Do you think (that) she can sing?
Will she make it in the music business?	Would you say (that) she will make it in the music business?
